Love One Another

Love. It is, perhaps, the "biggest" four-letter-word in the English language. It is somewhat sad that we use the same word to describe our affinity for hamburgers, our feelings for our spouse, and to describe how big a fan we are of a football team. Still, the concept of agape love is one that every Christian must get. We *must* love the Lord. We *must* love the souls of sinners. We must love our enemies. Maybe most overlooked is this fact: we *must* love one another. Why is it that we are sometimes more rude to our physical families than we are to total strangers? Why is it we sometimes show love to everyone except our brothers and sisters in Christ. How ironic it is that we sometimes act the most "un-Christian" towards Christians! Loving one another is a concept we *must* put into practice.

First, loving one another is a command. That is what Jesus called it in John 13:34. "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, even as I have loved you, that you also love one another." Jesus repeats that in John 15:12 and 15:17. God, through Paul, teaches us the same in I Thessalonians 4:9. To love one another is both the message from the beginning and a command from God (I John 3:11, 23; II John 5)

Second, loving one another shows growth. Putting others needs before my own is a sign of growth emotionally, mentally, and spiritually. Loving one another shows growth in our relationships (I Peter 1:22). Loving one another shows growth in being more like God (I John 4:7, 11, 12). Loving one another shows our growth in obedience to God (Rom. 13:8).

So, take the time to get to services early this Wednesday evening. After services, take the time to stay a little later than you might usually. Talk to your brethren. Get to know them. Ask how they are doing. Show a genuine interest in them. When you go home, pray for them. Encourage and praise those who are doing well. Invite a family or two over for supper this weekend. Agape love is way more than hospitality and kindness. However, we have to get into each other's lives and start building relationships with one another if we are going to love one another as we should. To be the people the Lord commands us we must love one another. If we are going to grow as we should, we must love one another. If we are going to influence and be an example to the world around us, we must love one another. Finally, if we want a home in Heaven we have no choice - WE MUST LOVE ONE ANOTHER!

It was a rainy evening in late 2008, as Josh Marino sat on the cement steps outside of his small apartment on base at Fort Riley, Kansas. His injuries sustained while deployed near Baghdad had left him isolated, fearful and depressed. He had a suicide note typed on his computer, a knife placed by his bed, and his last cigarette in his mouth. This was the last night he intended to battle PTSD. As he smoked, a scrawny wet kitten emerged from the bushes and curled up next to him. Josh cried; the kitten purred. While he fed the starving kitten, a new sense of purpose and hope was born in a deeply scarred soldier.

Most of us have never experienced an "emotional hole" that deep, but most of us have faced discouragement or depression. Can you recall a particular event, like Josh's kitten, that turned things around? Maybe it was a letter from a family member telling you how much they loved you. Was it a visit from a friend or a note of encouragement? It might have been a sunrise, sunset or rainbow.

Many a person has been rescued by recalling the familiar childhood lyrics "Jesus loves me this I know". Others have opened their Bibles and read the comforting words, "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want", or "I will never leave you or forsake you."

Friends, none of us are alone in our struggles. Far from it, we are loved by the creator of the universe and possess talents that can change the world around us. May we always be alert to the kittens and the people that the Lord sends our way. —Don Loftis
